

Hearts AfireValentine Weekend February 9 – 11

Valentine's Day holds special significance for Loveland. In 1972, Doris Pfiester began stamping Valentines with a special Loveland Postmark — 36 cards the first year. Articles in many papers published the service, which had expanded to more than 10,000 Valentines by the early 1990's. The Chamber of Commerce took over the project in 1989, expanding the program by choosing a new Valentine Lady each year, a Valentine Breakfast (register at www.lmrchamberalliance.org), and a yearly Valentine Card design contest.



In the News Around Ohio

(from Ohio History Connection publications)

Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks

On September 19, 2023, the Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks was officially inscribed into UNESCO's World Heritage List, culminating a process that began in the mid-1990's. With this announcement, the Hopewell Ceremonial Earthworks is now part of the 1,199 natural and cultural sites spanning the globe that possess "Outstanding Universal Value" to humanity.

This group of eight sites created by ancient American Indians some 2,000 years ago now joins such notable and revered landmarks such as Stonehenge, the Grand Canyon, and the Great Wall of China. The Earthworks include the Fort Ancient Earthworks and Nature Preserve near Oregonia; Newark's Great Circle and Octagon; Mound City's Hopewell Mound Group; and Chillicothe area Hopeton Earthworks, Seip Earthworks, and High Bank Works.


The World Heritage Committee met in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia and a small delegation from Ohio attended, including Chief Glenna Wallace of the Eastern Shawnee Tribe. In her acceptance remarks, Chief Wallace said, "I'm just brimming with joy to know that more people will see and learn about the amazing work of our ancestors from 2,000 years ago."

America 250 – Ohio (Semiquincentennial)

In 2026, the United States will celebrate its 250th anniversary! Congress has suggested each state create their own "Semi-Quin" commemoration by celebrating the contributions of its citizens over these past 250 years. In 2022, the America 250-Ohio Commission was launched by Governor DeWine with the goal of developing and coordinating an 88-county commemoration – so watch for news of future celebratory events and activities.

The goal of the Commission is to facilitate educational and commemorative activities at museums, libraries, historic sites, cultural centers, and educational institutions and amplify the under-told stories from Ohio's illustrious history. The Commission is jumpstarting this process by offering grants for projects and activities that will showcase the achievements, struggles, honors, innovations, and significance of all people in Ohio from before its founding to the present day. Grants of up to



\$50,000 are available to organizations (nonprofits, educational, and local government), as well as to independent artists and musicians.
