Lunch & Learn "Quakers and the Underground Railroad"

Wednesday, April 18th; 11:30 – 2:00 JoAnn Richardson History House

Continuing our series of Lunch and Learn sessions, we are fortunate to have Dolly McKeenhan from the Museum of the Friends in Waynesville.

Dolly has done extensive research on the settlement of the Quakers in the Waynesville area, beginning in the early 1800's. These Quakers from South Carolina left the slave state and began helping slaves make their way north to Canada – later named the Underground Railroad. She has also been involved with the Ohio River National Freedom Corridor project, which promotes the trail in the Tri State Area.

Report from ESCC Team

As reported in the Winter newsletter, the ESCC team of eight members has continued to meet monthly to design a written plan for GLHSM's future growth and stability. This includes objectives, goals and action steps, with specific dates and commitments from individuals in charge. One objective is to increase community awareness and recruit more involved members.

REBRANDING

The first strategy to meet this objective is called **Rebranding** – changing our name. A lot of research has already gone into this, including talking with the state historical society, which has changed its name to Ohio History Connection – connecting past history with the present and future generations. The local history organization has also changed from Ohio Association of Historical Societies and Museums to Ohio Local History Alliance (OLHA) – which is what it is, an alliance between the state and hundreds of local history organizations. Many other local organizations are doing the same.

The state spent over a year using focus groups and other means of discussion with stakeholders before making the change of name. One consensus was that "society" indicated an exclusive group limited to members only, to today's generation. History organizations are joining the 21st century with technology, perhaps an updated name will explain that we are a "place" that can share and celebrate Loveland's history with the community today and in the future.

The team and board members have suggested two guidelines: Make it shorter and keep Loveland in the name. Here are several suggestions from the team and board members: Loveland History Center; Loveland History Museum; Loveland Museum Center; Loveland History Connection.

We value your opinion and would like your input regarding these suggestions. Please call 683-5692 or e-mail (<u>glhsm@fuse.net</u>) your thoughts about these names. Whatever name we choose has to be approved by the Ohio Secretary of State, so we would appreciate your thoughts no later than May 1st.

INTERACTIVE TIMELINE AND EXHIBITS

Another strategy to meet the objective to increase awareness and involved members is to explore designing interactive exhibits. Working with a Xavier history class, the team has begun by doing research of hands on video/audio for the Time Line. This project will go into next year and beyond and might involve pursuing a grant. In the end, we will eliminate both time lines and be able to use that room for small groups which will help get the community into our lovely museum.

Along with the time line change, we want to research other ways to show off our exhibits and tell stories of past Loveland residents and what this connection is with the future.

MORE INVOLVED MEMBERS

A third strategy involves innovative programs and better public relations. Our programs have been well received, but getting the news out is always a problem. But even more so now that the local paper is not doing much Loveland news and the Enquirer is less than successful. What do we do to increase our social media presence?

In this busy world, finding innovative and interesting programs and exhibits gets more and more difficult. What can we do to make our museum more welcome and interesting to the community – and to potential volunteers?

Thanks to team members, Kate Arnold, Andy Bateman, Rob Bauer, Jan Beller, Pete Bissman, Norman Neal, Sue Peterson, and Jenny Shives, and our consultant, Brian Robson for all the time and energy spent on this effort.

WWI Lunch and Learn



It was unfortunate that only a few people came to the WWI Lunch and Learn. It was an excellent presentation of personal stories of veterans who participated in some of the significant battles. Jeremy Bowles had done extensive research to tell the stories of several WWI veterans, who probably never shared these experiences when they returned home. Everyone here said, "too bad more people could not hear this"!

Preservation at Work

One of the primary goals of GLHSM is to preserve Loveland's past – not only artifacts, but the stories that go with the objects or informational materials.

We spend a lot of time cataloging and taking care of our signature collection of Nancy Ford Cones prints and other memorabilia. But another category is fabric – usually in the form of clothing and quilts or coverlets.

But sometimes we receive something unusual – like quilt squares. Found recently were 35 nine-inch quilt squares, called nine patch, made with silk from used dresses. Each square was pieced together by hand – circa 1910.



Unfortunately, the fabric is too old and fragile to be sewn together as shown here. After consulting with member and quilt expect Barbara Davis, it was decided to frame nine of the most stable pieces, so we could show the intricate hand sewing that was done in years past utilizing used clothing.
