Results from the ESCC Team

A summary was in the Summer 2018 newsletter. For new members and review for others, here is a brief summary and update of results of the year's work:

VISION STATEMENT: To continue building an appreciation for the rich historical heritage of the Loveland area by preserving and promoting its history for future generations.

REVISED MISSION STATEMENT: To collect, preserve and display historical information pertinent to the Greater Loveland, Ohio area, be regarded as a local authority on historical designation, serve as curator of locally significant art, and foster within our community an appreciation and curiosity regarding our area's past.

OBJECTIVE: Increased community involvement, awareness, presence. More excited, involved membership.

STRATEGIES

Name Change: Chaired by Rob Bauer, this was done in the fall of last year – Loveland Museum Center. We kept Loveland and Museum and made it shorter and easier to remember. Center was added since we do have several facilities – Bonaventure House Museum, 1797 Rich Log Cabin, Rosemary Nisbet Library & office, and JoAnn Richardson History House (meeting room).

Several members are now working with Peter Sexton, a graphic designer, to come up with a logo and new signage. Our goal is to preserve the historic significance of the former name.

<u>Interactive Display:</u> Phase one, the third-grade tours, with the help of Peggy French, Pete Bissman, Sue Peterson, Chair, Jenny Shives and Norman Neal, is moving forward. Although we did not receive the state grant, thanks to the generosity of our members, equipment has been purchased, and the time line moved to the library. The plan is to have this complete by May 1st, in time for this year's tours.

The next phase will include links to various topics, including early families, railroads, early businesses, churches, schools, Nancy Ford Cones, and more. Some of these sections will use personal stories. **Do you have a story to tell?** We are eager to do some oral and video interviews with long time Loveland residents or descendants of early settlers.

Membership & Attendance: Sue Peterson has stepped in as program chair and a new program committee met in the fall and did some preliminary planning of events and dates. The very successful February "Step Back in Time with Wine" tasting event was the first example of our efforts to bring in new people.

Laurie Rose Gordon

Our dear friend and board member, Laurie Rose McIntosh Gordon died January 14, 2019 after a long battle with pulmonary and heart issues.



Laurie was born May 7, 1941 at the Henry Ford Hospital, Detroit, MI. WWII Honor Roll Restoration

Now that the shell of the WWII Honor Roll Kiosk is safely in a storage area, an ad hoc committee of interested volunteers will be meeting in early April to get the project moving forward.

The task involves finding a place for the kiosk, determining a cost estimate, and proceeding with actual work on the structure. Chairperson Jim Grethel has found a friend to help with the restoration and cost estimates, but more help will be needed.

The next step is to find an appropriate place for the kiosk. The committee feels it should be on public property in order to share it with the community.

Fund raising has already begun. The museum has received \$1750 for a good start - \$1500 from the Loveland Legacy Foundation, and \$250 from the Heritage Advisory Council (HAC). This octagonal kiosk, designed by local artist Carl Zimmerman was dedicated in the Pennsylvania Railroad Park, honoring Loveland area WWII veterans. Around the top, in gold, were the insignia of the various branches of the service. Inscribed on the top: "We Honor These Who Serve for God and Country in All Our Thoughts and Prayers".

The Honor Roll listed over 500 names of local WWII service men and women. At one side was a stand with a glass top under which anyone in the community could place news of persons in service and benches surrounded the honor roll. Mayor Dr. J.T. Hutchinson dedicated the monument. It remained in the park from 1944 to 1953. It was donated to the museum by Chris Moore, in honor of his father Kenneth Joseph Moore.

Historic Preservation Design Review Committee

Last spring, the City of Loveland established the Historic Preservation Design Review Committee to create what is called a Certified Local Government (CLG). The CLD Program is a nationwide initiative providing technical assistance and small grants to local governments seeking to preserve the important and significant aspects of their The CLG program fosters a unifying link heritage. between local, state and federal preservation organizations, creating a productive network and genuine partnership. This program gives national recognition to preservation commissions and empowers communities in their preservation efforts.

This program enables each sate historic preservation office to administer the CLG program and reserve 10% of federal allocations for grants available to participating local governments. Grants fund a variety of preservation activities, including architectural and architectural surveys, National Register nominations, educational brochures, and guidelines for design review and feasibility studies of historic structures.

Andy Bateman and Jan Beller share one position on the Loveland Historic Preservation Committee and were sworn in by Mayor Kathy Bailey last May, along with four other Loveland residents

The CLG was approved by the state and the committee choose a preferred consultant for historic preservation. The committee just heard that the grant was approved to hire this consultant so they can begin work on creating guidelines and boundaries for historic preservation. The committee plans to submit a preliminary preservation plan for a public hearing to solicit input late this summer. It will then be taken to City Council for approval.

The Historical Society and many residents are pleased that the city is moving forward with this plan after several previous attempts to form the CLG failed in the past. Many than 40 state communities have successfully used the CLC certification as a guide to preserve the historic significance of both restoration and building new

structures. It often raises property values and encourages residents to maintain an area they call home.

Although guidelines and boundaries are being designed for East Loveland, the program could extend to areas in all directions within the city, if individuals, streets, or businesses requested it.
