Local Authors Book Signing Series


The Loveland Museum Center is excited to offer a series of sessions with local authors who will share their stories and sign your copies of their books.

June 27 Butterfly Grandma: Monarchs!

Mary Ann Falter narrates a delightful, whimsical conversation in rhyming verse, between Grandma and grandchild in a quest to attract monarch butterflies to their yard!

Butterfly Grandma: Black Swallowtail!

A fun, educational book full of amusing drawings and detailed photographs explaining the life cycle of this butterfly, as well as flowers to plant to attract them.

July 11 Edible Flowers: A Global History

Mary Newman relates the fascinating history of how flowers have been used in cooking, from ancient Greek dishes to the today's molecular gastronomy and farm-totable restaurants.

July 25 Luce the Goose: Searching for Love



July 25 presentation

Another children's book, *Luce the Goose Searching for Love* by **Kay Bolin** is based on a true story in Loveland with a lesson that Luce teaches us all. It is beautifully illustrated by local artist Gregg Litchfield who used digital and watercolor for a process he calls "Paintography".

Kay will also share her second story *Luce the Goose: Memories of Dream Street,* which follows Luc's family and their explits.

Aug 29 Pretty Blue Death

Oct 17 Ghosthunting Ohio: On the Road Again



Loveland U Returns

The Loveland Museum will again host Loveland University, sponsored by the City of Loveland. The first session is September 15 at LMC.

Organizer of the program, Ray Kingsbury explains that this is "the coolest civics class you'll ever experience". Drawing on the 2019 collaborative partners, Little Miami Conservancy, Loveland Stage Company, Loveland School District, Loveland Museum, and a variety of Loveland City Departments, Loveland U 2021 will provide an exclusive "look behind the scenes" of the Loveland Community.

Limited to just 25 individuals, Loveland U is an adult learning environment with practical exercises that help relate a topic to real world experiences by identifying an issue, educating on how one might address it, and allowing teams of participants to apply their knowledge, with minimal lecture time.


Jerry grew up in Norwood and graduated from Purcell High School. He enlisted in the US Army and was stationed in Korea. He had numerous positions in banking, including Clermont National Bank in Loveland. He retired as auditor for Bank One.

A very community minded person, Jerry was the first President of the Loveland Businessmen's Club, served on City Council, was President of Kiwanis and a member of the VFW. He was a parishioner of St. Columban and Good Shephard Catholic Church.

He knew no strangers and had a beautiful way of making people feel special. He will be remembered for his kind and generous nature, big smile, and his sense of humor.

Internment was at Gate of Heaven with a private service.

History Repeats Itself



As the City of Loveland investigates installing parking meters as an experiment, I couldn't help looking back in time to August 1954 when Loveland installed about 100 parking meters on Jackson, Broadway, Taylor and Railroad Ave.

According to the Loveland Herald after one week, \$91 was collected and by the following year they were averaging \$95 per week. After a year of use, an informal survey, indicated most local merchants were in favor of the meters, although many were negative at first.

In late 1955 a parking lot was opened for the newly constructed Brown Building, but I could not find when the parking meters were taken down.

Congratulations to Heather Stein Russell Enquirer's 2020 Woman of the Year

Congratulations to member and Loveland resident, Heather Russell, for beging chosen as one of 10 area women who have supported philanthropic efforts and who have improved cifvic life through their investment of time, energy and their belief in helping others.

Heather runs Change Court, a specialized docket in Hamiton County Municipal Court and a restorative program that allows women who have been sextrafficked to get help and reclaimn their lives.

Those backing her nomination said not everyone can look back and see the difference they've made in the lives of others. Heather was instrumental in starting Change Court in 2014. Two Cincinnaati police officers talked to Russell about these so-called criminals who were suffering as victims. She responded, bulldozing a path for human-trafficking victims in Greater Cincinnati with this specialized program.

Heather is married to Randy Russell and they have two grown childrenn. She went to Miami University and University of Cincinnati College of Law.

When asked what inspires you to give back, she answers "I wish everything wasn't so politizcized. If we, at a local level, could reorganize ourselves to say, "Who wants to work on this problem, we would find we have more in common than what separates us."

Nancy Ford Cones Featured

Hill Wagoner Family Cemetery Restoration

The Hill Wagoner Cemetery located just over the Warren/Clermont line off Rt. 48 is on the property where Condos will be built soon. The earliest grave date is 1800 for Elizabeth Hill and her husband John, 1803. In 1990, the DAR listed 31 names here, including Burton, Simonton, Ramsey, Hall, Michaels, Radcliff, and others

The site has been neglected for years and the gravestones are hidden with overgrown vines and dead trees. Terry Easton, a volunteer with the Warren County Genealogy Society and expert on cemetery restoration has generously given his time the assessing a restoration project and offer to work with the city, scouts or other volunteers clean up the small site.
